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
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Letter from the Editor

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





## SCHOOL TIPS AND TRICKS







# SUMMER UPDATES CONTINUE INTO FALL

McDowell Intermediate High School underwent many renovations and changes over summer break. Students may notice big changes to the cafeteria as well as the upstairs 2-200 section, but the biggest changes are ones they can't see.


MIHS principal Scott Quivey says, "We are updating our HVAC (heating, ventilation, and air conditioning) systems, electrical and networking in the renovated areas."

Renovations like these require contractors to work inside of the building's ceilings, which therefore required new drop ceilings to be installed in the classrooms affected; over the last two summers, these renovations have been done in phases. Some happened over the summer, but the 2-200 section of MIHS was blocked off throughout the first quarter.


"We had some teachers/classrooms that have been temporarily displaced as the work is completed. These staff members will be back in their original classrooms once the work is done," Quivey says.

The final phase of the project will take place during the summer of 2024 and will carry into the first quarter of the 2024-2025 school year. Those renovations will result in the creation of brand new family and consumer science classrooms and kitchens at MIHS.

"All family and consumer science teachers are moving to MIHS and all technology education teachers are going to McDowell's Senior High for the 2024-2025 school year," Quivey says.

MIHS was built in the 1970s so renovations to these systems are to be expected.

"These changes are necessary because we have an older building that was not functioning as efficiently as we would have liked," Quivey says. These renovations are meant for students and staff to feel more comfortable in the building. Heat and air conditioning sometimes fluctuates, as well as, allowing for better use of technology throughout the building.


While it has taken some time and there may have been some frustrations adjusting to these changes. Quivey says, "Our school community has been very flexible in adapting to the renovation process."

Current sophomore Nora Vitron says, "I think it's easier to navigate the lunchroom with these changes. The walkways aren't as crowded since the lunch lines are contained in the walls.

I think the overall flow of the lunch room is organized much better now."

Lisa Czejdo, one of the teachers who was relocated due to renovations says, "at first I was very nervous about where I would be placed but Mr. Quivey was very helpful and did a great job at making sure every teacher had their own space to teach and grow." Students can expect more changes next summer at the senior high school. The auditorium is currently being used as a store room, but will be transformed into classrooms.

There will also changes to the library, and others to ease accessibility throughout the school. AC units are to be fixed only in the basement of the senior high by next summer. The entire school's AC system is expected to be done by 2027 at the latest. The senior high building will continue to be renovated over the next four years.



The 2-200 section of MIHS was blocked off so that renovations in a number of classrooms could continue during first quarter, leaving multiple teachers displaced. Teachers were able to return to their rooms before quarter two began.

As seasons start to turn a new leaf, so do grocery stores. Autumn begins in the United States on Sept. 22, but if you walk into a grocery store in the middle of August, whether it's coffee, Oreos, cereal or surprisingly, SPAM, the first item usually on display is pumpkin flavored. Many people around the world stand by the idea that "it is never too early for pumpkin spice," but this year, it should've waited until the end of September.

August and September are still summer months and usually are the hottest months of the season compared to June or July. The average August temperature in Erie this year was 80 degrees with a low of 72 a high humidity and very little rain. The beginning of September reached the same temperatures as August, with highs in the 80s, if not higher, and high humidity. Pumpkin-flavored items usually taste best towards the end of September when the weather has cooled down to 40 or 50 degrees and autumn has officially begun.

Another reason pumpkin-flavored items came out too early this year is pumpkin harvesting. Most pumpkins in the United States are not ready to harvest until early- to mid-September. Looking at traditional pumpkin recipes using real pumpkins, most of them aren't possible to make until mid-September. If you buy pumpkin bread off of a shelf at a grocery store in August, it has an artificial pumpkin taste, which is more pungent than sweet. If the pumpkin craze waited until the end of September to take place, the taste of pumpkin would be more genuine and authentic.

Just like people get tired of ice cream during the summer because they have had too much of it, the same thing applies to pumpkins. By the time autumn



hits, pumpkin items have been out for over a month and a half. Having the same thing over and over again starts to have an effect on people's taste buds and mentality, causing people to be tired of pumpkin by early- or mid-September, not even making it until October. If pumpkin items waited until the end of September to release, the pumpkin craze would last until Halloween instead of dying off before the leaves do.

Finally, grocery stores release pumpkin-flavored items earlier in the year as a way to capture people's attention to make money. If they waited until the middle or even the end of September to release these items, they would make more money because of the limited release or time frame.

Starbucks released its fall menu on August 24, leading to record-breaking weekly sales after the 20th-anniversary launch of their spiced menu this year, according to an article from the Associated Press. And it will stick around until even after the holiday drink menu tempts customers with gingerbread and peppermint.
